Meghan Constantinou will deliver a lecture entitled 'The library of the Elliots of Minto, 1738– 1938: A panoramic view'. This presentation offers the first substantial study of the library of the Elliots of Minto, a prominent Scottish aristocratic family active in the legal, political and social landscape of Great Britain between the eighteenth and early twentieth centuries. Based on research supported by the Bibliographical Society's Fredson Bowers Award, it draws upon a rich cache of primary documentation to reconstruct and contextualize the library in several distinct phases, from its establishment in the 1730s to its dispersal in the first half of the twentieth century.
